In a recent planning meeting, the Brazoria County Master Gardeners decided they would provide the Master Naturalists with an opportunity over the next three years to implement a prairie garden and constructed wetland at the Master Gardeners Education Station, the former Angleton Experiment Station off Hospital Road and CR 171.

The Master Gardeners have much to help contribute to this project including a greenhouse for propagation of seeds and plants, irrigation, garden tool and machinery and muscle power.

So, this is a call to you prairie types and also those interested in pond construction and a constructed wetland facility to get in touch with Rich Tillman or Ed Barrios and we will begin planning. Again, this is a long-term project, so we are not in a big hurry to have something on the ground next week, but we want to put something in that everyone would be proud of and that will demonstrate the beauties and serenity of the tall prairie grasses that once flourished in our area.
